employees as acting judges undermines the independence of the judiciary.

Response to statement of Minister of Justice

The General Council of the Bar of South Africa (GCB) regrets the statement [made on 18 February 2010] by the Minister of Justice and Constitutional Development defending his appointment of serving public servants as acting judges. For the reasons given in the GCB's earlier correspondence to the Minister, the GCB considers that this stance is flawed. The Constitution contemplates a separation of powers, and the appointment of public servants to the judiciary is inimical to this.

The GCB has taken note of the indication in the Minister's statement that Adv Mpshe has requested the President to allow him to vacate his office, and the subsequent indication by the Minister's spokesperson that the President has granted that request. The GCB is, however, concerned, that in the Minister's statement he indicates that his decision to appoint Adv Mpshe as an acting judge would have remained the same regardless of whether or not Adv Mpshe was still an employee of the NPA.

The GCB has previously pledged its support to the Minister

and offered to work with him in addressing the challenge of delivery of legal services to the poor. We reiterate our pledge of support to the Minister. As in the present instance, however, we expect to differ with the Minister from time to time. When this happens, it is to be hoped that it will be recognised that this is because the GCB represents independent-minded lawyers, instead of its position being characterised as politically motivated. The GCB first raised this issue, through appropriate channels, at a Heads of Court meeting in September 2008, and again in correspondence with the Minister recently, to which it received no substantive response.

The GCB hopes to secure an urgent meeting with the Minister in order to discuss with him these important matters.
